- Provide humanitarian assistance in the wake of natural and man-made disasters.

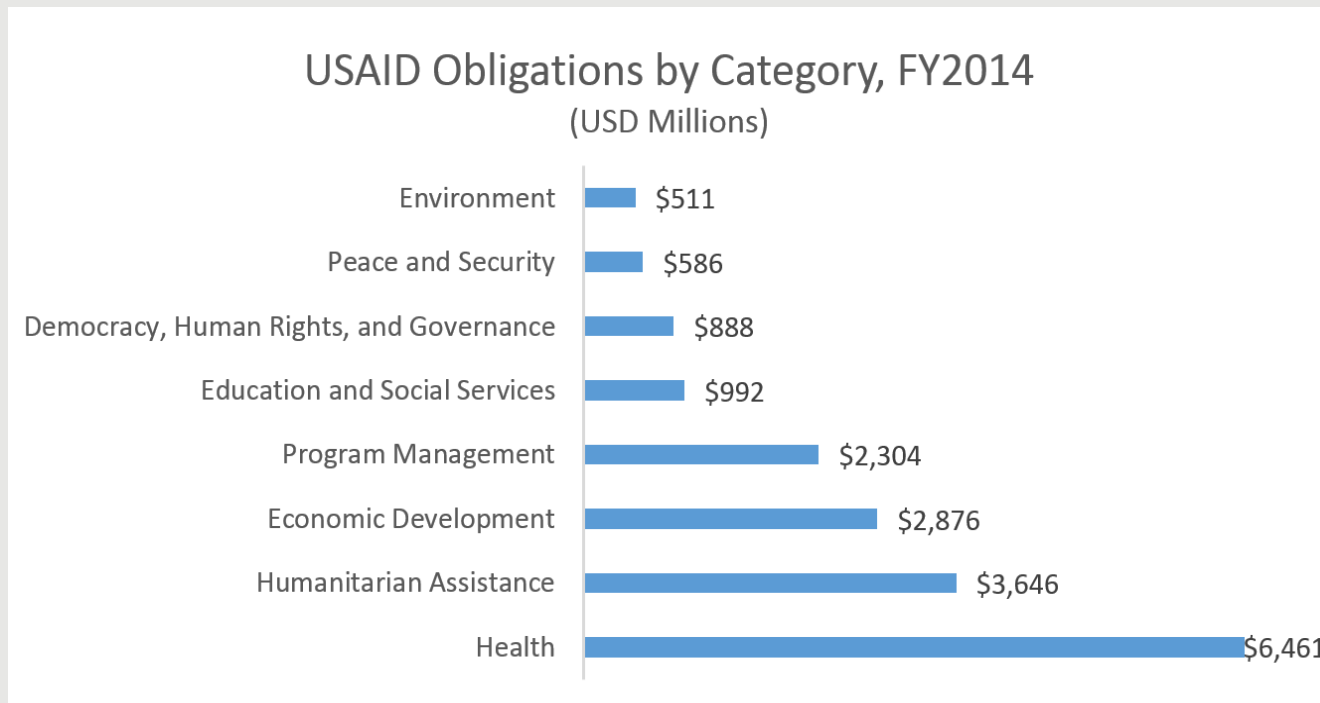

- Competitively select leading organizations/institutions as partners to implement the programs (Contract, Cooperative Agreement, or Grant mechanism).



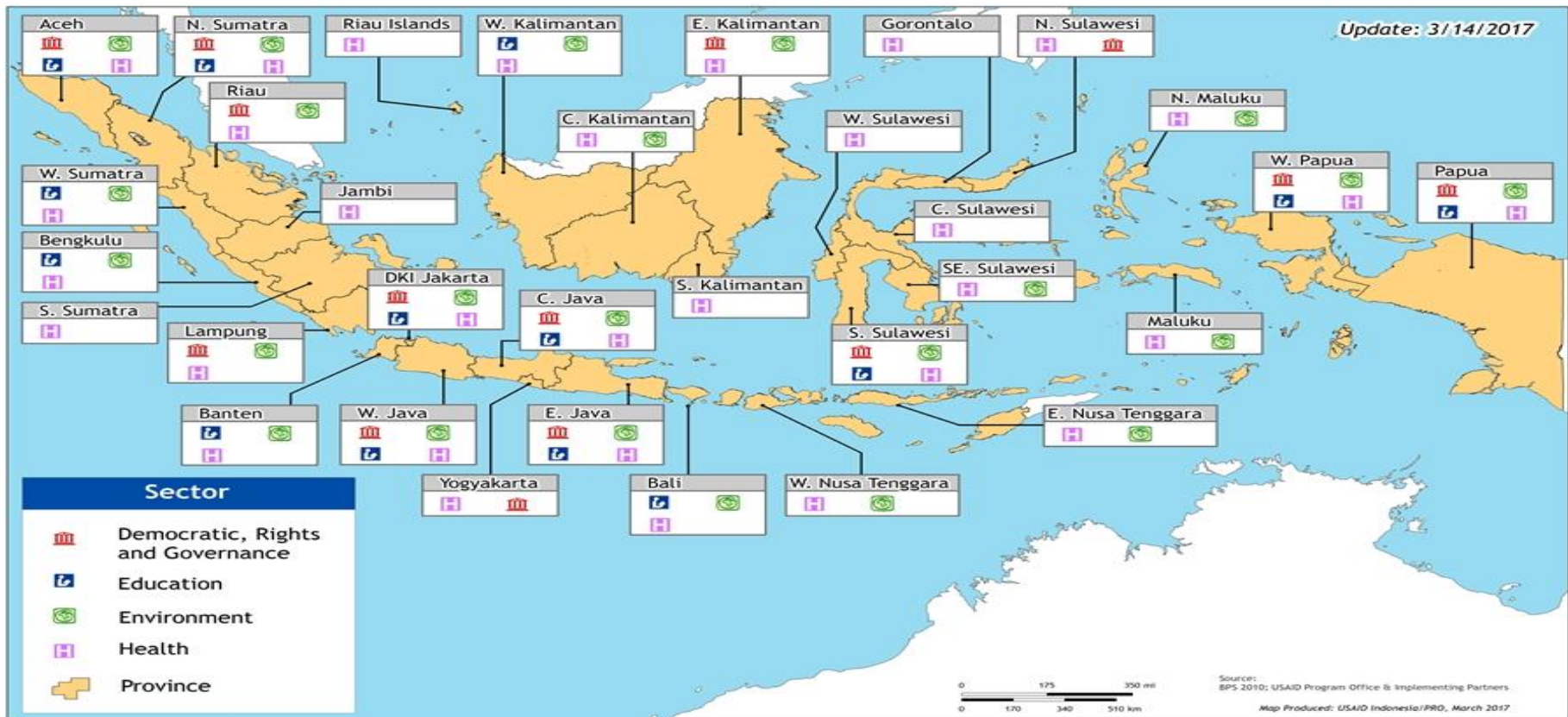

## USAID Indonesia Activities by Sector

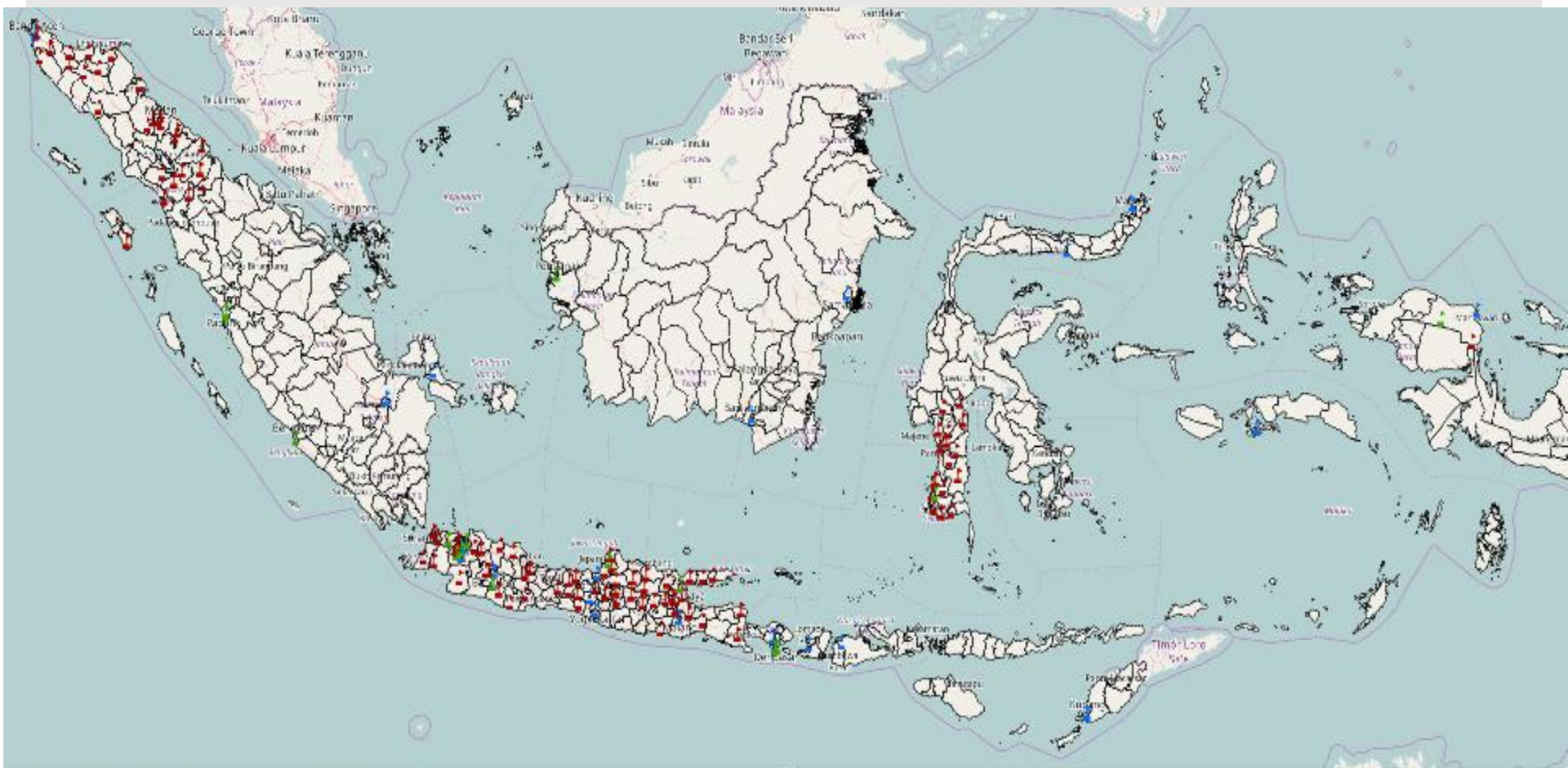

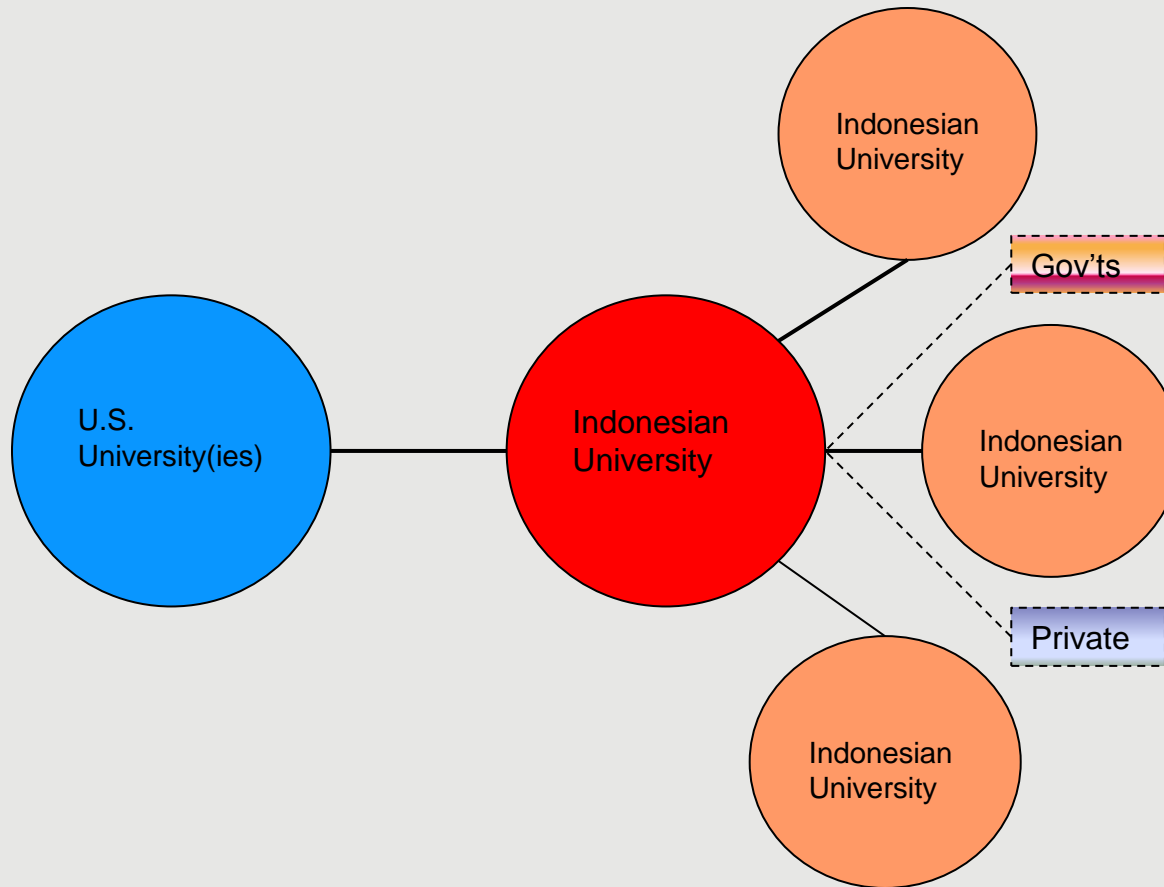

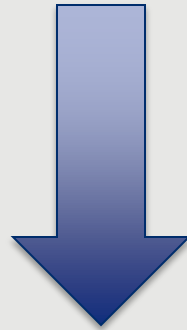
